Dear Gary,






Copper City Fossil Hunting!





Books of interest to the Montana Rockhound



Lanny Ream's classic collecting guide to Montana has stood the test of time. Sadly, no volume two was ever published. But that does not diminish the information available in this little pamphlet. Although no longer in publication, it is usually available used. Lanny covers 21 different collecting localities – eight fossils or petrified wood, and 18 mineral sites. And before someone says we editors can't do math, several sites offer both fossils and minerals. Over 2/3 of the sites are an easy daytrip from Helena. As always, double check current access requirements, fire conditions, and claim status before venturing out to collect.
